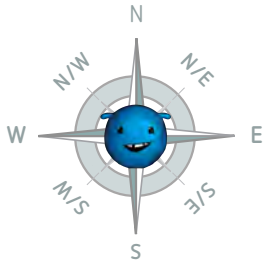

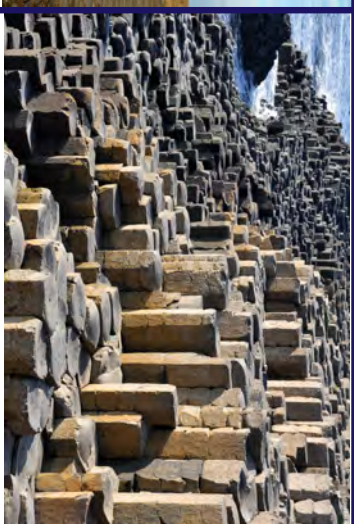

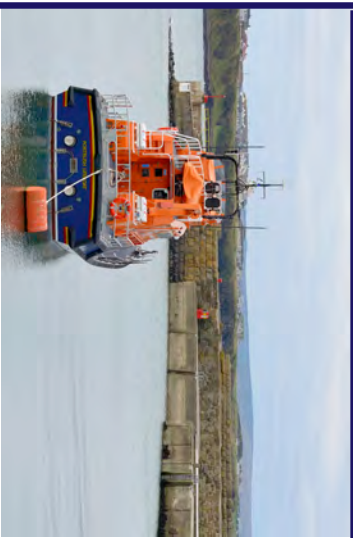

People come to London from all over the world: around 300 different languages are spoken in this city!

A places in history

Over the centuries, London has seen many historic events, including the Black Death in 1665 and the Great Fire of London in 1666. The 'blitz' – the bombs of the Second World War – also left its mark.

Today, you can visit many historic buildings, such as churches and royal palaces, to find out about London's past.

Like the River Thames, London doesn't stand still. New buildings appear every year: the Shard, a new 95-storey skyscraper, is the tallest building in Europe! Inside, you'll find offices, restaurants and a hotel.

Central London has a modern steel 'wobbly bridge' built for people, not cars. When it first opened, the Millennium Bridge wobbled a bit too much, but engineers soon sorted that out.

Eels, oysters and wild salmon all live in the Thames: it's one of the cleanest city rivers in the world.

- Piccadilly
- Victoria

London has railways above ground too, including the Docklands Light Railway, where the trains drive themselves!

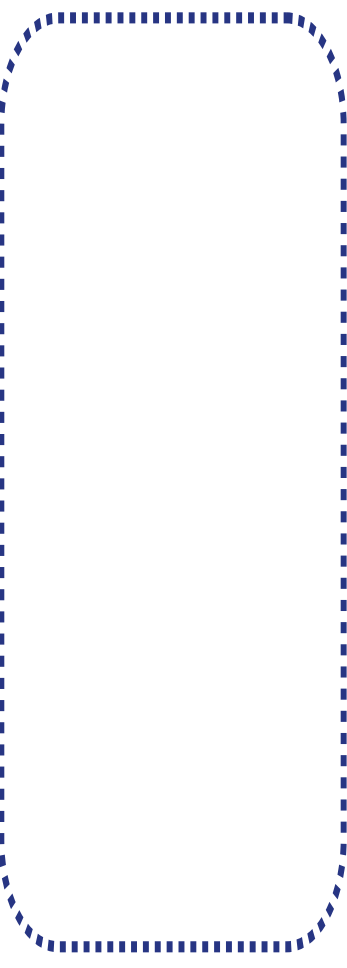
